- * sepsis is the leading cause of death in ICU
- * 200,000 cases of sepsis occur every year in the UK alone
- * severe sepsis can increase the chance of mortality up to 50%
- * 1,400 people worldwide die of sepsis every day
- * the incidence of sepsis is rising

THE INCIDENCE IS RISING



STAG is currently carrying out an audit on patients presenting to the Emergency Department with sepsis.

What is STAG?

STAG is a multidisciplinary team that has been undertaking national audits of clinical priority areas since 2002.

STAG is part of an established National Audit Group and collect information on patients that attend the Emergency Department or that are assessed by a Critical Care Team.

What is SEPSIS?

Sepsis can affect a person of any age and is a serious condition. It occurs when the body's normal reaction to inflammation or a bacterial infection goes into overdrive.

The terms blood poisoning, septicaemia and septic shock are often used to refer to sepsis.


STAG and YOU
